DAY I OF PROV. ASSEMBLY; 'MY LOOK AND THE LOOK OF OTHERS.'

ONDAY, 20TH

JANUARY 2020, WAS THE ARRIVAL DAY FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. WHICH WAS HELD IN TAMALE AT THE TAMALE INSTITUTE OF CROSS-CULTURAL STUDIES. IN THE EVENING, ALL THE FORTY-ONE CONFRERES FROM THE GHANA AND NIGERIA SECTORS CAME TO THE LECTURE HALL FOR THE RECOLLECTION IN READINESS FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY DELIBERATIONS ON THE FOLLOWING DAY. THE RECOLLECTION WAS PREACHED O U R ВΥ CONFRERE SERGE AFTER BOROTO THE OPENING PRAYER FROM YOSEF GIDAY. THE THEME O F T H E RECOLLECTION WAS 'MY LOOK AND THE LOOK OF OTHERS.'

THE PREACHER BEGAN BY TELLING US ALL TO SHOUT TO THE MASTER OF THE MISSION WITH THE WORDS OF BARTIMAEUS, 'MY TEACHER LET M F SEE' (MK 10:47-51). HE SAID, 'EACH ONE OF US NEEDS THE GRACE TO USE PROPERLY THE GIFT OF SIGHT TO LOOK AT IN A OURSELVES NOT NARCISSISTIC WAYTHAT COULD RESULT IN DISORDER ТО DISREGARD OTHERS BUT A CONSTRUCTIVE MANNER' WHICH COULD RECOGNISE MAKE US STRENGTH OUR AND LIMITATIONS. O U R LIMITATIONS BECOME CLEAR, BECAUSE, WHEN LOOK A T OURSELVES, W E DISCOVER THAT IT IS NOT POSSIBLE TO LOOK OUR OWN FACES, BUT OTHERS CAN LOOK AT THEM. HENCE THE NEED TO REALISE THAT THERE ARE SOME OF SHORTCOMINGS OUR THAT CAN BE NOTICED BY OTHERS OF WHICH WE OURSELVES MAY NOT FOR THIS BE AWARE. REASON, HE SAID, 'WE NEED ΤО LOOKΑТ OURSELVES AND OTHERS AND TO LET OURSELVES BEING LOOKED AT BY OTHERS.

HOWEVER, THE PREACHER SAID, 'LOOKING AT OTHERS AND LETTING OTHERS LOOK AT US IN OUR INTERCULTURAL COMMUNITIES IS NOT ENOUGH, WE NEED THE LOOK TO JESUS CHRIST T O BRING TRANSFORMATION IN OUR LIVES SO AS TO BECOME LIKE O U R FOUNDER CARDINAL LAVIGERIE WHO HAD IN HIS HEART THE PASSION FOR THE GOSPEL AND THE DESIRE THAT IT BE ΤО PROCLAIMED ALL, HIMSELF MAKING "EVERYTHING ТО ALL" (CF. I COR. 9:22). IT IS IN THIS MANNER, THE PREACHER SAID 'AS MISSIONARIES, WE WILL DO AWAY WITH ALL THE PREJUDICES WE BRING IN OUR INTERCULTURAL COMMUNITIES THAT MAKE IT DIFFICULT TO APPRECIATE OTHER CULTURES AND EMBRACE ALL CULTURES.' IN ALL OUR APOSTOLIC AREAS INTERCULTURAL COMMUNITIES WE WILL BE ABLE TO WITNESS TO THE LOVE OF JESUS. FOR OUR LOOK WILL BE LIKE THE LOVING LOOK OF

JESUS WHICH HE EXPRESSED IN THE TEXT OF THE RICH MAN IN THE GOSPEL OF MARK WHICH SAYS, 'JESUS LOOKED AT THE RICH MAN AND LOVED HIM JUST AS HE WAS' (MARK I0:17-27).

DAY TWO OF THE PROVINCIAL ASSEMBLY: REPORTS FROM COMMISSIONS AND REVIEW OF THE POST-CAPITULAR ASSEMBLY RESOLUTIONS

Day two of the Provincial Assembly was

mainly allocated to JPIC-ED, Media and Child Protection commissions, and also to review the resolutions taken in the post-Capitular Assembly of 2016. The commissions gave reports of the activities they carried out in 2019 and also unrolled their plans for 2020.

The most prolific message came from the Child and



Vulnerable Adult Protection Commission, which was presented by Victor Shehu and Jacek Wroblewski. They gave definitions of the child, child abuse, forms of child abuse (physical, psychological) as well as a definition of who is a vulnerable adult (someone under your power e.g. workers in our parishes or communities). They warned confreres not to mess around with workers, and always to protect children in their working places. The following five principles are important for safe guarding vulnerable adult: confidentiality, empowerment, prevention, proportionality

and protection. How do the Missionaries of Africa handle cases of abuse? To this Victor and Jacek explained that the Society has guidelines, which are followed whenever there is a case of child or vulnerable adult abuse. Moreover, the Society organizes workshops to train its members on how to handle child or vulnerable adult abuses.

The JPIC-ED report was presented by Gaspard Cirimwari, who is the Provincial Coordinator of the JPIC-ED Commission.



address, he highlighted the activities which they executed in 2019 in both Ghana and Nigeria. Among others he mentioned workshops on human trafficking and domestic violence which were organized in both Ghana and Nigeria. Also he gave a feedback on the illegal mining workshop, which he attended in Rome. He called upon confreres to empower communities to say "no" to exploitation of minerals in their areas, to know their rights and sensitize them on Garamuze (illegal mining) activities. For 2020, Gaspard revealed that the JPIC-ED team has organized a provincial workshop in Wa, on conflict resolution. The purpose of this workshop is to equip confreres and lay people belonging to JPIC-ED groups in our parishes with skills in preventing or handling conflicts whenever they occur. Lastly, Gaspard ended his remarks by calling upon the Province to establish vocation skills training centres. He explained that this is the only way to tackle the issue of youth unemployment.

The of the last report commissions came from the Media team. Serge Boroto, the Provincial Coordinator of this team, started his remarks by explaining the origin of the Media Commission both at the level of the Province and at that of the Society. I will not say much about this, because elsewhere in this number of the Link there is full article on this topic. Nevertheless, the whole idea behind a media commission is evangelization. And the big question is: how can we use media in our ministries? On the achievements of the Media Commission of the Province since it was established in 2016, Serge mentioned the following: the creation of a website for the Province; a WhatsApp group page, through which we can share events taking place in the Province, such as ordinations, major celebrations and workshops; a Facebook page and also a YouTube page;. Regarding the website Facebook pages, Serge called upon confreres to visit and use them for communication and sharing of activities going on in their areas through these media platforms, because we want to know what is going on in all these places, Serge insisted! At the end of his exposition, Serge rolled out the media team activities aligned for the New Year, which will take place in Ghana and Nigeria. He invited all confreres

to take part in these organized events actively.

At the very end of Day Two, there was a review of the resolutions that were made during the post-Capitular Assembly of 2016. They were scrutinized one by one. All were happy with the progress made so far; a good number of these resolutions have been implemented after the Assembly. To mention but a few: a new project in Minna was started; the financial policy for the province was documented and distributed to confreres; establishing a support for means of transport to new confreres and many others. On the other hand, confreres had to swallow their pride, discovering that projects

like Dungu, establishing a house in Accra/ Kumasi, and the writing by confreres of their will, have not yet been implemented. All this invites us to make greater efforts to realise those projects. Also, confreres called upon the Provincial Council (PC) to do more regarding on-going formation by sending more confreres for studies in JPIC -ED, Media, etc. They also reminded the PC of the need of opening centres for our Province. We should not focus exclusively on parish work, and, if a need be, we should even close a parish in order to open a Centre! Lastly, confreres proposed fresh resolutions for the next three years, and set up the Strategic Plan

Committee with the task to work out the details of such Strategic Plan and submit it to the PC. It was a tiresome day, but worthwhile and very enriching.

DAY THREE OF THE
PROVINCIAL GENERAL
ASSEMBLY; WORKING
TOWARDS FINANCIAL
SUSTAINABILITY

On 23rd January, 2020 the Provincial General Assembly was animated by Anthony Baaladong, the Treasurer General of our Society. In order to help us to a deeper understanding of 'working towards financial sustainability', he used the morning session for his presentation, followed by discussion, on "Mission Support Office and Income Generating Projects", while the afternoon was on the topic "Building Projects and Pension Fund". We ended the day **Eucharistic** with the Holy and Celebration а fraternal supper.

Financial sustainability is all about answering these two questions: 'How do we ensure that our financial resources cover our needs for today and far into the future? How do we finance our apostolate and care for the confreres in the long term?'

In order to achieve financial sustainability we need internal control, engage with professionals and greater collaboration. For

internal control, the Treasurer General tells us, we need to apply the "four eyes principle", that is, all important transactions are to be seen and confirmed by at least two people, who must be aware of what is happening. For example, a cheque should always be signed by two people. We need also a common accounting system

encouraged to have common policies on means of transport.

Hence, to reach financial sustainability, the General Chapter of 2016 encouraged "Mission Support and Income Generating Projects". (1) Mission Support Office is also known as Development Office. The 2016 General Chapter



package (Banana) and equip the financial committee with audit tools. All this will both protect ourselves and our money. We need also to with engage professionals: since we rely on our investments, we must learn and get advice from those wellequipped. And we need greater collaboration: it is a call to all all treasurers levels at to collaborate and work with a common policy on bereavement, for instance when a confrere loses his parents and relatives. They are

some of the objectives for it: mobilizing funds, promoting projects in our different provinces and training some confreres to know how to look for funds. This makes contracts office with Viatores Christi, and is linked with development committees; however, we are challenged to find a competent confrere to run this office. (2) Income generating projects: the 2010 General Chapter opened the door for them, and there was a lot of

enthusiasm in the different provinces. Different projects were explored, for example regarding real estates. And the 2016 General Chapter "encourages service-based income-generation projects in line with our charism" (7.2.1.c), such as Youth Centres, Renewal Centres, etc. These are some of places that started projects: PAO in Ougadougou; PAC in Bukavu; EAP in Kampala, etc. But we need to keep our eyes open about income generating projects: we must learn lessons from what happened in PAC and other places. We are all encouraged in our provinces to have a small manageable project that does not require too much capital. Therefore, for any income generating project, we must do a rigorous market study before starting; asking and finding out: what is this business? Have we made a market research? Who are our competitors? Where will we sell our product or who will be our clients? Who are the professionals involved in our projects? What is the experience of those involved in building? Where did they build before? Have we done a detailed study of our project to avoid modifications at the last minute? Have we thought carefully about the management phase of our project (How will we run our project?). Have we observed strictly the project management guidelines of the Society of the Missionaries of Africa?

The afternoon session was based on "Building Projects and Pension Fund". In building projects, there are some elements to consider: (I) a careful and detailed analysis and elaboration of the functionality of the property. We must ask: What exactly do we want and need the property for? What purpose is it meant to serve? For how many people is it? (2) We must think in the long term: that is, we may need our property to serve our needs of today, but it is very important that we keep our eyes also on tomorrow, on the future. (3) for any project, we must consult our confreres, they are the stake holders. (4) We must involve professionals right from the beginning till the end, making sure that everything is done in a professional manner. (5) Before starting any project, we must consider and know our income. Do we have enough to begin and complete this project? The last presentation and discussion were on the pension fund. From 2008, the Society of the Missionaries of Africa has a saving fund for confreres from Africa, Mexico, Philippines and India. The age of retirement is 65 and the average lifespan is presently set at 80 years. The Treasury General pays the initial amount into the fund, to secure the old age. And the province of origin of each confrere pays an annual amount for all its confreres into that pension fund. Once a confrere is 65, his monthly pension goes to the Bursar of the Province, where he is appointed; it does not belong to the individual. Even if you leave the Society of the Missionaries of Africa, you will not get it. We ended the day with the Holy Eucharist and a fraternal supper, which both took place at the Provincial House. Fr John Aserbire, the Provincial of the Ghana-Nigeria Province presided the celebration of the most august sacrament, while the Vicar General of the Tamale Ecclesiastical Province, Fr Matthew Yitiereh, concelebrated with him. After this we had our fraternal supper with joy and love. While rejoicing, the Vicar General, representing Most Reverend Philip Naameh, the Archbishop of Tamale, was given the opportunity to address us. He thanked God for the gift of the Society of the Missionaries of Africa, and for their memorable presence in the Northern part of Ghana. He said that without the arrivaof the Missionaries of Africa, life would have been



meaningless in the North because of the slavery and abuses of the northerners by the Southern kingdoms. The Missionaries of Africa, when they arrived, cared not only for the soul but also for the body. They taught the Christian faith, introduced modern education, and empowered local people in developing their milieu. He ended by saying that what he is today and the fact that he speaks to us in English is all because of the grace of God through the Missionaries of Africa. He prayed for more vocations for our society and for the divine protection upon us in our various places of apostolate.

The second day of our meeting started with a recollection to usher us fully into the mood of the meeting and to help us reflect deeply on the meeting and its essence. The

He journeyed with us on what it takes to embark on the journey from mono-cultural living to intercultural living, which we are called to. This is also the Society's dream. In his facilitation,

In the subsequent days, we embarked on individual sharing under the moderation of Fr. Virgilius Kawama M.Afr. Our sharing included our family backgrounds, our missionary journeys, our joys as well



"And he said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to do his harvesting" Luke 10; 2

They are not yet enough because of the great demand of confreres, but the arrival of the new confreres to the Province is certainly God's gift to his people. Towards the end of the year 2019, the Ghana/Nigeria Province received seven new confreres; these include four newly ordained priests: Pierre Chanel Ulama, working in Nigeria/Osogbo; Venant Bukuru working in Ghana/Bunkpurugu; Gabriel Michel Tewelde working in Ghana/Nyankpala; Jean Claude Habimana working in Ghana/Bolgatanga and Yosef Giday who has come back to the province after five years of service in his home province and then two stagiaires (John Atugonza, appointed to the Nyankpala community and François Bwana Nyembo, appointed to Osogbo). Another confrere, ordained early 2020, in the person of Alain Sossou Kokou is expected to join the Nigeria sector.

The arrival of these confreres is perceived by the host communities as a boost to the pastoral work. And they all cherish a helping hand. As it is often said, and I personally agree, that the first experience is very crucial and significant in the life of a missionary. The Provincial Council has asked all the communities to make sure that there is a conducive environment to receive the new confreres, which according to my colleagues and to my own personal experience was successfully done. Another aspect of hospitality towards the newly arrived confreres was to ask the vocation directors both in Ghana and Nigeria sectors to help them visit the sectors and know where other confreres are living and the type of apostolate in which they are involved. Here in the Ghana sector, this has started, as our first visit was to Wa community (St. Benedict Parish), in the Upper West Region of Ghana. Without delay, the team started working and created a Whatsapp

platform for the confreres originating from the Province and the confreres working in the Province. Ever since, the platform is daily fed with news,

information, formative articles, jokes and distractions, etc. However, though

some confreres were very happy to post anything and everything, the excess of posts made others realize that some vital information

> could be lost amidst these posts. This led to the creation of a new Whatsapp platform exclusively reserved for information from the **Provincial** Superior and the Media

achievement was the opening of the Provincial Facebook page entitled: "Ghana-Nigeria Province-Missionaries of Africa" which can be easily accessed via www.facebook.com/MAfrGhanaNigeria. As of February 9, 2020, 751 persons liked it and 794 persons followed it.

The media team embarked on reviving the written media by reviving the Ghana - Nigeria Link. So far, from 2016 to

2018, five publications were produced and disseminated both in hard and soft copies. The year 2019, however, was the most challenging for the team as it didn't witness any production of the Link. Other recent achievements consist of:

- A Provincial website:

- A YouTube channel,
- Some workshops in both sectors following the workshop on media held in Rome,
- Initiation of some confreres into the use of the Missionaries of Africa international website, especially in activating email addresses @mafr.org,
- Acquisition of a Projector and a tripod screen for the Ghana Sector, etc.

From its creation till date, the Media Team's challenges have been multiple. The main challenge has to do with the personnel. Fr. Prosper Harelimana was sent for studies, but continued to collaborate throughout. On the other, Fr. Andrew Anab was appointed to another Province. New confreres were appointed to the team, but some showed low or no interest at all. Such instability of personnel the affected regularity of production of the Link which led to its lethal stage of 2019. In addition, some of those who tried contribute significantly assumed other heavy responsibilities and moreover have less or no training in handling social media and media at large.

In view of facing the above challenges, the Provincial Council constantly appointed new members to the team. Within the period under review, Prosper Harelimana, Andrew Anab, Maralf Jiménez, Peter Nyirenda, Georges Kambembo, Jean-Claude Habimana, **Nicholas** Nzomo, Nkandu, Andre Christopher Schaminée, Pierre Chanel and John William Nkhoma have been members of the team. However, with the new strategy to attempt to do the coverage of the whole Province effectively and efficiently, the Provincial Council appointed the members from our apostolic areas: Jean-Claude Habimana for Navrongo-Bolgatanga, Nicholas Nzomo for Wa, Christopher Nkandu for Tamale, Prosper Harelimana for Kumasi, Pierre Chanel for Osogbo, John William Nkhoma for Minna, Gilbert Rukundo for Ibadan. Andre Schaminée Provincial Secretary, and Serge Boroto the team leader.

With regards to training, the Provincial Council mandated the media team to:

- Organize sessions/workshops for all confreres in the Province on Internet, WhatsApp, Blog, **Facebook** (their advantages and disadvantages) and how protect ourselves from them.
- Give training to confreres in accounting, in Excel, Banana program, Power Point and

basic skills in computer and making booklets.

- Organize sessions, where need be, on how to be present on Radio for evangelization or sharing the Word of God.
- Get some confreres to do special studies on Social Media and Communication.

Though a lot is yet to be done, the Media Team is hopeful that with appointment of the new members from the respective areas/communities it will be able to go further. With gratitude to the Provincial Council and confreres who have always been generous with their articles and other materials, we look forward to greater collaboration with all stake holders. More than ever, the social Media provide a tool for us to fulfil the recommendation of St. Paul: "I urge you to preach the word and insist on it in season and out of season" (2 Timothy 4: 2). Together, let us strive to discover and use the social media to be "all to all" for our fellow social Media users.

REJOICING AND CELEBRATING AS THE "SAINT PAULS" OF NORTHERN GHANA

We, the Ghana-Nigeria Province of the Missionaries of Africa, together with the Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Africa, came together for the climax of the celebration of the 150th anniversary of our foundation on Saturday 26 October 2019. This day of rejoicing started with the Eucharistic celebration at the Our Lady of Annunciation Cathedral, Tamale, at 9:30 am. Most Rev. Philip Naameh, Archbishop of Tamale and President of the Ghana Catholic Bishops' Conference, presided over the Holy Mass, and our Provincial Superior, Father John Aserbire, gave the homily.

This celebration was not limited to our little family of confreres who came from Nigeria and those in Ghana; hence hired canopies were erected outside the cathedral in view

of sheltering the many guests who could not find a place inside the cathedral. In the preparations of this day, the Family and Friends of the Missionaries of Africa in Ghana, known as MISA Family, were very active to make sure that we had a beautiful and successful celebration. The lay faithful came in their numbers, especially the elderly ones with memories of the pioneer missionaries. They had bought and wore the cloth printed for this event. Others, members of various associations and societies, came in their uniforms. Many Religious men and women, seminarians and novices responded to our invitation. More than 40 Priests concelebrated, exceeding the number of chasubles designed for the climax. We produced also a brochure for this occasion, which retraced briefly our identity and history as sons and daughters of Charles Cardinal

Lavigerie, explained what we are doing as mission and the activities we undertook during this particular year of jubilee.

Before we could line up for the procession, one could notice the joy of this day on the faces of people combined with the simple but beautiful decor. Images of Our Lady of Africa, of our Founder Charles Cardinal Lavigerie and of Mother Salome were placed in front of the altar. The Cathedral Administrator, Fr. Carolus Gambogi, welcomed us to this celebration calling us, Missionaries of Africa, the "Saint Pauls" of the Tamale Ecclesiastical Province. He said: "Today we have cause to rejoice and to celebrate with our Saint Pauls. I say our Saint Pauls because they brought the faith to us." As the liturgy unfolded, the Gospel procession added a colourful inculturation to the celebration: the





Dagomba group praised the Lord for the gift of the Missionaries of Africa who brought the Good News to this part of the country while mentioning the names of some of the founding fathers.

The homilist, our Provincial Superior, on his part did not hide the lighted lamp under the bushel; he acclaimed the vision of our Founder saying: 'Our Founder Cardinal Lavigerie, Archbishop of Algiers shared the Vision of Jesus. From Algeria in northern Africa he saw the continent of Africa to be a vast field needing to receive the Word of God. (...) Lavigerie like the prophet Isaiah in the first reading heard the voice saying "Whom shall I send? Who will be my messenger? And he answered "Here I

am, send me". He availed himself to realize the vision of Jesus. He founded the two institutes: the Missionaries of Africa (M.AFR) and the Missionary Sisters of our Lady of Africa (MSOLA) and sent them out to realize this vision by carrying out the Mission Christ entrusted to him. He told them: "Be apostles and nothing but apostles".' He furthermore praised the past and present missionaries while recognizing their weaknesses: 'the typical missionary (brother, sister or priest) in those days was a jack-ofall-trades: teaching, agriculture, building, administration, medical work, language learning, and cultural research, listening to people and preaching to them. (...) We too as we celebrate our 150th Anniversary of our foundation we acknowledge that our senior brothers and sisters met challenges (in areas of language, culture, weather, diseases), indeed we made mistakes but at this moment we can say: thank you Jesus for the mission you gave to the Lavigerie family.

We did our best and there are good results. The Church in Africa where we served has grown and continues to grow. We can count many achievements in the areas of education, health and growth in the number of Christians, Priests, Sisters, Brothers, Bishops, Archbishops, Cardinals and so on and so forth.' Fr. John Aserbire concluded the homily

by encouraging us to 'fully depend on God as we appraise the giftedness of our communities and as we address the tasks ahead of us. We are facing a new challenge since some time: the issue of insecurity in our sub-region and other parts of Africa. Jesus is asking us to bring peace, to be people of peace. We ask God to enable us to build bridges, to enforce unity, and to extend this peace to our homes, to our communities and our sub-region and Africa at large. Let us ask him to bless us with his empowering Spirit so that we may share in God's work and experience our Lord's transforming grace through ministry and apostolic work.'

Goodwill messages were addressed to us for our celebration and it is worth quoting parts of them:

'I sincerely thank the Lord for this occasion when we celebrate his gift of the Missionaries of Africa and the Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Africa in your 150th Jubilee Celebration. We bless and thank Him for what He has achieved for Ghana and Africa through the humble and zealous instrumentality of the Missionaries of Africa. From the onset of the cholera epidemic in 1867 which left a large number of Algerians orphaned, and the education and Christian instruction of these children on rocks, which occasioned the founding of your Society in Maison-Carrée (now El-Harrach) near Algiers, you have never slackened in your calling' (Most Rev. Gabriel Justice

Anokye, Metropolitan Archbishop of Kumasi).

'The diocese of Yendi, is grateful to the pioneering work of these gallant missionaries who have watered the seed in the past years till present. We pray that God may look kindly upon their good works and reward them exceedingly. For those who have passed on to eternity that he may give them a merciful judgment. May our Lady of Africa, whose bronze statue is still venerated in Algiers and through whom many have received miracles continue to intercede on behalf of the Missionaries of Africa and the Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Africa' (Most Rev. Vincent Sowah Boi-Nai, SVD, Bishop of Yendi). As you celebrate 150 years, we sincerely do so wholeheartedly with you. The Bishops, Priests, Religious Men and Women, the Laity of the Province, on this historic occasion, once again pledge our unconditional support to sustaining the Mission of Christ you brought to us' (Tamale Ecclesiastical Province).

You sowed the seed of Evangelization and the propagation of the Gospel in the midst of daunting challenges when the first Missionaries arrived in Navrongo in 1906 in the then Northern Territories. Since then, you have not relented in ensuring that the GOSPEL reaches even the most remote communities of this Ecclesiastical Province and many parts of Africa. This has been by the Grace of God

through Christ, the inspiration of the Holy Spirit and the continuous intercession of our Holy Mother, Mary' (MISA Family).

The alleluia of the official hymn our 150th jubilee echoed outside the Cathedral at the end of the Eucharistic celebration. As the festive mood continued, a fraternal meal with tasty Ghanaian and continental dishes

was then served to our guests. The cutting of the cake, the popping of the champagne added to the jubilation of the day. In the evening, the sons and daughters of Lavigerie met at the Provincial House for a family supper. We remain grateful to God for the vision of our Founder: may our passion for the African World increase and go far and beyond the 150 years of our foundation for the greater glory of God.

FIAN LAND; A PROPERTY OF THE MISSIONARIES OF AFRICA

Fian is a village in the Upper West Region of Ghana. It is 39 kms from Wa town on the Wa - Tumu road. It is situated between the villages of Naro and Busie and it is the turnoff to Funsi and Welembele on the Fian - Navrongo Road (via Sandema). Fian is in the administrative district of Nadowli. Ecclesiastically, Fian belongs to the Daffiema Parish of the Wa Catholic Diocese. It is an outstation with a resident catechist.

Background

According to some of the early Christians of Fian such as the late Augustine Mwindigu and the late John Baptist Banoenoma (catechist), the Missionaries of Africa came to Fian in the 1930s. Their hope was to settle in Fian and propagate the Catholic faith to the people in Fian and the surrounding villages. The Chief of Fian, Naa Ballannoe and the local people did not allow the Missionaries to settle in their land and this made the Missionaries of Africa to move towards Daffiama where they setup their mission, given they had already established The Jirapa parish. Missionaries were not happy with the Chief and people of Fian and as such "invoked a curse on them" for not allowing the gospel to be propagated in their land.

Reconciliation

In the areas where the Missionaries of Africa settled, they established missions, schools and hospitals, making those areas develop more rapidly compared to where they weren't. Seeing Fian missed that grace, this has led the current leaders at Fian to regret the earlier rejection of the missionaries and seek reconciliation with the Society of the Missionaries of Africa. This action of coming back on the rejection of the missionaries has been celebrated in 2014. The several ways since reconciliation ceremony took place on Saturday 28th June 2014, led by the then Provincial Superior of Ghana-Nigeria Province Fr. Dominic Apee, assisted by confreres from the Wa community (Lavigerie house), after which crosses were planted at several points in the village to mark this reconciliation.

To reinforce this bonding, the elders of Fian community decided to offer the Society of the Missionaries of Africa a piece of land in their village by signing an undertaking with them which read: "We, the undersigned elders of Fian agreed to release a plot of land situated at Tampie hill near the community to the Missionaries of Africa (White Fathers) for their missionary work other development projects". This is an invitation to us from the people of Fian, which they hope will lead to a presence of the Missionaries in the village.

The piece of land gifted to the Missionaries of Africa is 50 hectares in size, well located along the Wa-Tumu road (tarred). It is well positioned on a raised granite rock on one side offering a panoramic view of the

village and its surroundings. The confreres in Wa (Lavigerie Community) have been working towards the acquisition of legal documents of the land, which they acquired in October 2019. This plot is now the property of the Missionaries of Africa.

Fian land comes to us at the occasion of the 150th Anniversary of our Society, 150 years of being faithful to the Gospel we have received. It comes to us as an event of reconciliation and collaboration with a particular population.

The 28th General Chapter (2016) encourages the Society to be prudent, to have foresight and flexibility concerning property. Here comes the task to the Ghana-Nigeria Province to see what the Fian land could hold in the near future, given we are sent out to the world and wherever our charism is needed, for a prophetic mission of encounter and witness to the love of God!
